In January 2024, an invitation was extended by the MMC&RI for the inaugural function of its Centenary Celebration, which was held on January 20th and 21st at the Platinum Jubilee Hall, JK Grounds in Mysuru. Around 20 doctors from Golden Jubilee batch of '74 attended the event, marking a significant occasion for the institution. During the meet, some of us had the opportunity to meet with Dr. Dakshayani, Dean and Director, MMC&RI as well as Dr. Chandrashekhar, Assistant Professor of Surgery who is also the faculty in charge of student welfare activities.

As a batch, we felt a strong desire to give back to our Alma mater during this milestone year—the Centenary Year—especially as the Golden Jubilee batch. We shared this sentiment withDr. Dakshayani, and expressed our interest in contributing in some way to commemorate the institution's rich legacy. Dr. Dakshayani was supportive of our idea and promised to come back with suggestions on how we could make a meaningful contribution.

The journey of giving back began from that point. The proposal was then shared with our batch through the WhatsApp group, where everyone began to brainstorm ideas on how we could collectively contribute to MMC&RI in honor of its Centenary Celebration.



OUR OBJECTIVE:

Our goal was to give back to our Alma mater in a way that would benefit:

- 1. The student community including medical, paramedical and nursing students
- 2. The faculty of the institution
- 3. The patients served by the institution

To ensure active participation, we held weekly Zoom discussions, allowing even our classmates abroad to join in. We communicated our objectives to the Dean, who was supportive and offered several potential locations around the campus, particularly near the Academic Block. This process began in February.

As we explored the suggested areas, we encountered numerous challenges. There were technical, feasibility, and accessibility concerns that made many of the locations unsuitable. After careful consideration, both the institution and our batch rejected several options.

By June, the area in front of the Academic Block — an old, dilapidated pond — was offered to us as a potential project site. The idea was to transform it into a multipurpose utility area. After several rounds of discussion, weighing financial aspects, maintenance requirements, and safety concerns, we collectively chose to accept the project.



HOW WE GOT STARTED:

1.CONCEPTUALIZATION OF THE PROJECT:

The idea of using the Banyan tree as a concept was introduced to the group for discussion. The Banyan tree symbolizes strength, wisdom, and resilience — qualities we hoped to convey through this project. We envisioned creating a structure that embodied these ideals, with features like seating areas, shelter, and a garden-like atmosphere surrounded by trees, providing both functionality and a sense of tranquility.

2.FUNDRAISING:

Based on rough estimates, we anticipated that the project will require around Rs.20 lakhs to complete. An appeal was drafted and sent out to the batch members. In order to ensure inclusivity and participation we tried to reach out to those whom we knew but could not contact. Reaching out to many required us to track down contact numbers, reconnecting with individuals after many years, and introducing ourselves again — a process that was both heartwarming and nostalgic. It was a unique experience, reconnecting with old friends, learning about their achievements, challenges and life journeys, and eventually bringing up the topic of contributing to the project.



The responses we received were varied and often amusing, which could be categorized as follows:

- Category 1: Those who willingly agreed to contribute and even offered to contribute more if necessary. This was the most encouraging response, and it fuelled the fundraising efforts.
- Category 2: Individuals who agreed but required multiple reminders before finalizing their contribution.
- Category 3: Those who initially agreed but later backed out for personal reasons.
- Category 4: People who agreed initially but avoided further communication, not responding to calls or messages.
- Category 5: Those who initially pledged to contribute more but backed out when approached for a second time.
- Category 6: Individuals who, when approached, became argumentative or defensive about the project or their contribution.
- Category 7: Those who expressed doubts about the project's completion and therefore hesitated to contribute.
- Category 8: Those who initially refused but later volunteered It was interesting to observe and analyze these different reactions some amusing, others enlightening as they reflected various perspectives and personal situations.

Once we reached a sufficient target amount, we began the search for an architect to help bring our vision to life.



3. SEARCH FOR AN ARCHITECT:

Finding the right architect took nearly two weeks. Fortunately, through a serendipitous connection, we were able to get in touch with Prof. Dr. Ajai Chandran from Christ University. He was quick to agree to our project proposal, despite our limited budget and high ambitions . He started the work immediately and within a week presented us with 2-3 design options. These designs were shared during our weekly Zoom meetings, where we had detailed discussions. Over 2-3 sessions, we provided inputs, clarifications, and made modifications, resulting in a mix of agreements and disagreements among the group. However, consensus was necessary before moving forward.

Once we finalized the design, we presented it to the Dean, but unfortunately, it was rejected outright due to factors beyond her control. This setback led some in the group to suggest abandoning the project and returning the funds, including myself. However, some were determined to not give up. The matter remained unresolved for over two weeks, with no one taking any further action.

After few weeks, a meeting happened with the Dean to discuss the project. Dean had few requirements regarding the design and structure. On reaching a middle ground we accepted the Dean's suggestions. Our architect then had to re-work on the plan to meet these new specifications.



This process also pushed our budget beyond its initial limits, requiring another round of fundraising. During this phase, we once again encountered the same varied responses mentioned earlier. Nevertheless, after much struggle and consensus-building within the batch, and with final approval from the Dean, we moved forward.

This phase of the journey took an additional three months, stretching into the end of August, before we could finally proceed with the project.

4. GETTING STARTED:

The date for the Valedictory function of the Centenary Celebrations was scheduled for September, but we realized there was no way the architect could promise to complete the project before the event. While we had hoped to unveil the structure during the celebrations, we understood that rushing the process would compromise its quality. We decided to extend the timeline to ensure that the final result would reflect the effort and dedication put into the project. The Bhoomi Pooja for the project was conducted by us on 15th September 2024, after which construction commenced immediately.

COINING THE NAME:

While the construction work was underway, we focused on finalizing the name for the space, drawing inspiration from the symbolic concept of the Banyan tree. After much discussion, we decided to name the area 'Aaladamara,' incorporating a Banyan tree logo to embody the core idea. Given that the space had a central pond surrounded by trees and buildings, we chose to call it Aaladamarada AngaLa.

In the center, we envisioned and decided to erect a stainless steel structure to symbolize the Aaladamara. Additionally, a stone monument was created, inscribed with the significance of Aaladamara, carrying a message that embodies the spirit of the place. The design for the name board and the central stainless steel sculpture was also conceptualized by Dr. Ajai Chandran. We are pleased to announce that the project is now complete, and the inauguration will take place on Sunday, November 24th, 2024, with Dr. Dakshayani, Dean and Director of MMC&RI,

presiding over the event.



CONCEPT FOR AALADAMARA SCULPTURE

At the core of Aaladamarada AngaLa stands a stunning stainless steel banyan tree sculpture (GOI Patent No-438140-001), symbolizing wisdom, strength and interconnectedness. The banyan tree, revered in Indian culture, represents shelter, growth and the nurturing of generations—values that resonate deeply with MMC & RI's legacy.

Crafted from stainless steel, the sculpture combines tradition with modernity, reflecting sustainability and longevity. The polished surface captures light, symbolizing clarity, enlightenment and the enduring impact of knowledge. Its roots and branches spread out in a harmonious design, illustrating the support and togetherness shared by the institution's alumni and students.

This centerpiece is not just a work of art but alumni's favorite space in campus. It is a space for reflection and community, fostering collaboration and inspiration beneath its symbolic canopy. It stands as a tribute to the institution's century-long legacy and the Batch of 1974's commitment to sustainability, progress and the values of their alma mater.

SIGNIFICANCE

CULTURAL IMPORTANCE

• The Banyan Tree (ಆಲದಮರ) is India's National Tree and has been revered for centuries as a symbol of shelter, stability and growth.

Symbolism in Hindu Mythology

- The tree is considered sacred and a manifestation of the Trimurthy:
 - Lord Vishnu resides in the bark.
 - Lord Brahma is symbolized in the roots.
 - Lord Shiva is present in the branches.
- Known as the Kalpa Vriksha (Wish-Fulfilling Tree), it is believed to grant desires and bring prosperity
- Associated with Goddess Savitri as Vata Vriksha, the tree symbolizes life and immortality, aligning with the project's long-lasting impact on future generations.

RELEVANCE TO AALADAMARADA ANGALA




